



Dear Public Health System Partners:

We are excited to release our Fiscal Year 2014 Annual Report and 2015 Calendar of Events. The enclosed pages show that Fiscal Year 2014 brought many changes, one of the most significant being the retirement of Franklin County Health Department's (FCHD) Director, Paula Alexander. Ms. Alexander retired at the start of May 2014 and became Mrs. Paula Sucher very shortly thereafter. The Franklin County Health Department (FCHD) and Board of Health congratulates Paula and Chuck on their wedding and wish them the best. We are grateful for Paula's years of leadership and commitment to the health of Frankfort and Franklin County. FCHD's Accreditation Coordinator, Judy Mattingly, was appointed as Paula's successor.

Fiscal Year 2014 also kicked off a new cycle of assessments including the MAPP (Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships) community wide strategic planning process and Community Health Assessment (CHA) and FCHD's internal strategic planning process. These efforts are ongoing and are also integral to FCHD's accreditation.

FCHD continued its quality improvement efforts and was awarded two National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) Promising Practice Awards in 2014. One practice was entitled "Get 'er Funded" and addressed FCHD's grant application process and increased grant funding received. One such grant was awarded by the Kentucky Department for Public Health and allowed FCHD to partner with Walk/Bike Frankfort to develop a pedestrian master plan. See page 14 for more about this grant.

The second practice, "Policy, Systems and Environmental Change Strategy to Increase Access to Pediatric Dental Care," was a partnership between the UK Mobile Pediatric Dental Unit, Franklin County Public Schools (FCPS) and FCHD that continues to provide dental care to eligible FCPS elementary school students through the placement of electrical outlets that power the mobile unit. We are extremely appreciative of our many public health system partners for helping us to **Prevent** disease and illness, **Promote** health and wellness and **Protect** Frankfort and Franklin County. Thank you! We hope you find this calendar useful as you plan your events and set community priorities.



MAPP is a community owned process made up of over 80 local partners in Franklin County. 2014 began a new cycle year for evaluating our community's health status based on MAPP's four Assessments: Community Health Status Assessment, Community Themes and Strengths Assessment (Quality of Life Survey), Local Public Health System Assessment (National Public Health Performance Standards), and Forces of Change Assessment.





FCHD Staff and KSU Nursing Students Practice Emergency Response Skills at Annual "Three for Free" Drive-Through Flu Clinic



FLU VACCINATION DRIVE THRU CLINIC



FCHD's annual "Three for Free" Drive-Thru Flu Clinic is used as a training or exercise to prepare personnel who will serve in a surge capacity. The exercise assesses FCHD's support personnel and infrastructure capacity for providing surge capacity for rapid detection, investigation, and containment/mitigation of public health problems and environmental public health hazards. "Three for Free" specifically serves to test our community's mass medication dispensing ability. Mass dispensing of medication within a short window of time would be needed if a major disease outbreak or incident of bioterrorism were to occur. The clinic follows the Strategic National Stockpiles (SNS) Countermeasure Dispensing Program. During the "Three for Free" Drive-Thru Clinic, Kentucky State University nursing students provided assistance in giving shots along with health department staff. A total of 169 vehicles passed through the Point of Dispensing. Two hundred forty-eight vaccinations were given during the two-hour clinic. The average time from registration to receiving the shot was seven minutes! During the October 30, 2014 exercise over 800 pounds of non-perishable food and \$200.00 dollars in donations were received by the Emergency Food Pantry for Franklin County.

Franklin County Home Health provides skilled services in the home allowing individuals to recover in their own environment. The services provided are



Nursing, Physical Therapy, and Occupational Therapy. In some cases the patient may qualify for assistance with personal care and homemaking through our Medicaid Home and Community Based Waiver Program. It is our goal to provide the patient with personal, compassionate, professional services to prevent re-hospitalizations, nursing home placements, and further debility. We work with the patients' doctors to develop individual care plans. Some examples of services provided are wound care, medication and diagnosis teaching, intravenous infusions, assessments, teaching caregivers how to care for their loved one, rehabilitative exercises after knee and hip replacements, strengthening and self care after hospitalizations or surgery. Develop public health policies and plans

The Healthy Communities Pedestrian Master Plan For the City of Frankfort, Kentucky



A healthy communities grant was awarded to FCHD for 2014 to improve access to physical activity by developing a Pedestrian Master Plan for the City of Frankfort. FCHD, in coordination with The City of Frankfort, Franklin County Emergency Management, Kentucky State University, WalkBike Frankfort and Downtown Frankfort Inc, promoted and conducted a "sidewalk survey" to determine where the Frankfort community would prefer to see new sidewalks and improved pedestrian routes. Our planning team's goal was to craft a Pedestrian Master Plan that would be easy for the City Commission, City staff, and the larger Frankfort community to support and adopt as a framework for establishing

new sidewalks that could connect neighborhoods with parks/physical activity outlets and increase access to healthy food venues. The Pedestrian Master Plan is realistically composed of feasible projects that reflect the wishes of the Frankfort community. Many thanks to Frankfort's City Commission who adopted the Pedestrian Master Plan on July 28, 2014 to provide guidance to City staff and the City Commission as new sidewalk projects are considered in the future. Having an adopted plan in place will make it much easier for the City to secure grants and outside support for new sidewalk development, resulting in significant savings for the City of Frankfort.

The Environmental Health team regulates onsite wastewater disposal pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statutes and adopted regulations. The Registered Sanitarian is conducting a site evaluation to determine size, type, and depth of a septic system. Sanitarians inspect, permit, and regulate over 40 various types of facilities and areas in Frankfort and Franklin County, to ensure that the publics' health and safety is protected every day. Enforcing public health laws and regulations is essential to a healthy community.

For more than 35 years, the Franklin County Health Department has collaborated with local veterinarians to provide low-cost rabies vaccination clinics every May. Kentucky rabies law requires all cats, dogs and ferrets over 12 weeks of age to maintain a current rabies vaccination. This partnership delivers a lowcost service that protects pets and their owners. Our success with this program is not limited to Franklin County citizens alone; many people drive in from other counties to take advantage of this program.



Evaluate and continuously improve health department processes, programs, and interventions



FCHD continues to implement several quality improvement projects annually. Two of our biggest successes came out of clinic and school health. Clinic has implemented same-day scheduling where the no-show rates have plummeted to less than 1%. School health and the school board implemented a policy indicating all students must be seen by the school nurse before being sent home resulting in a significantly lower rate of absenteeism.

A new FCHD QI Steering Team was created in September of 2014. The team members are to be the point person for their individual departments in providing guidance and assistance with health department wide QI projects.

Working on Wellness (WOW) is a television program produced in partnership with our local cable network, Frankfort Plant Board's Cable 10 Advertising. The monthly healthrelated segments allow the local health department to provide an example of how our partners evidence-based programs can be incorporated into current media outreach to disseminate vital preventive care information to target groups within our community. WOW provides an innovative solution to sharing timely health messages with residents that might otherwise experience barriers to information sharing. The WOW program has recently been submitted to the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) Model Practice Database.

Smoking is the leading actual "cause of death" in the U.S.; and these deaths are preventable. Sciencebased programs to help individuals stop smoking are important interventions for public health and the healthcare delivery community. The Cooper/Clayton Method is being implemented by every health

department and the Kentucky Cancer Program throughout the state. As the former Director of Cancer Control in Kentucky, it is apparent to me that the Cooper/Clayton program is the most popular and respected cancer control initiative in Kentucky.



Maintain capacity to engage the public health governing entity

Governing Board Functions include (902 KAR 8:150):

- Assure that the services provided meet the needs of the local citizenry, to protect and promote public health.
- Establish priorities and objectives based on a community assessment and resources of the agency for:
- Service delivery, considering federal and state disease prevention and health promotion objectives; and
- Specific health and safety needs of the community.
- Assure that financial controls and program evaluation measures are ongoing to facilitate effective and efficient agency services and operations.
- Interview and hire an agency director in accordance with 902 KAR 8:040 through 902 KAR 8:140.
- Communicate board policies and priorities to the agency director:
- Evaluate the performance of the agency director, at least annually. The director/administrator must have clear direction from the board and is accountable for execution of board policies;
- Review information and data provided by the agency director to assess the effectiveness and efficiency of the agency in complying with federal and state public health laws, regulations, and board policies; and
- Promote professionalism in health department operations in fulfilling its public health mission.
